# Evolutionary Role of Culture amongst Cape Muslims

One of the key objectives of the Boorhaanol Islam Movement is to capture the cultural traditions of the Cape Muslims for posterity, an objective that has evolved over time as the Movement itself has evolved. While the Movement was established by Imam Abdurahman Bassier and Dr Achmat Davids in the sixties as a vehicle for socio-economic upliftment, Imam increasingly lived his life as a paragon of traditional Cape Muslim culture, while Boeta Achmat turned to the archives in researching and dissecting those traditions and cultures.

They understood the critical role that culture played in the survival, sustainability and spread of Islam in a

hostile environment, and their legacies bear ample testimony to that. Theirs was a symbiotic relationship that was deep-rooted, diverse and divinely ordained, such that by the nineties they had established the practical and theoretical paradigm of culture's essential role to Islam

at the Cape.

Over the ensuing years the Movement had built on that platform via publications like Boeka Treats, analyses like Taraweeg Surveys, and annual events like the Muharram March, personalised Qurbaan and Maghrajaan.





However, it is vital that cultural

traditions not be misconstrued both in its definition and flexibility in our community. Despite its predominant influence in Islam at the Cape, cultural traditions are not sacrosanct, and should be adapted as times change if they are to remain relevant and vital to a community. With the advent of younger generations who may not appreciate its significance in times of great technological advances and sociological changes, the static nature of traditions may diminish its relevance and ultimately threaten its sustainability.

The tradition of Moulood is a case in point. It has deep roots in the history of our community, possesses multiple dimensions that were often initiated centuries ago, like the rampie cutting and the Moulood jamaahs, and remains a strong bond among families. Yet over the past few weeks the Movement has published a survey which shows a sharp

decline in the number of male Moulood jamaahs, which could indicate that the youth are showing little interest in that activity.

The Boorhaanol Bilal Team has also just returned from Port Elizabeth where they witnessed a sharp decline in interest in Moulood among under-fifty year-olds.

At the same time, the Movement embarked on producing a book on Moulood containing the riwaayats of Barzanji and the Ashraqal along with its translation, and encountered numerous challenges in that process. These include updating the translation, understanding the nature of these Moulood

Qasidas like Barzanji, Sharaful Anaam and



Qasida Burdah, and grappling with the chronology of the verses. The end result is that Boorhaanol decided to adapt a few aspects of the Barzanji Moulood and the Ashraqal, in the light of our understanding of this genre, which ultimately is not sacred. For the Holy Quran declares:

## تِلْكَ أُمَّةٌ قَدْ خَلَتْ لَهَا مَا كَسَبَتْ وَلَكُمْ مَا كَسَبْتُمْ لَا تُسْأَلُونَ عَمَّا كَانُوا يَعْمَلُونَ وَلَا تُسْأَلُونَ عَمَّا كَانُوا يَعْمَلُونَ

That was a people that hath passed away. They shall reap the fruit of what they did, and ye of what ye do! Ye shall not be asked about what they did.

(Al Bagarah 2:141)

And Allah knows best.

# BOORHAANOL PRODUCES HISTORIC MOULOOD BOOK AND AUDIO COMBO

With the successful completion of the Ratibul Haddaad book and audio project, the Boorhaanol Movement was encouraged to attempt the same with another iconic cultural tradition of the Cape Muslim community, the Moulood-un-Nabi celebration on the 12th Rabi al-Owal.

This project started at end of August, which gave the task team exactly 50 days till Monday 18th October 2021, the day of the Koemies Moulood. While the template was in place insofar as the role players and the format was concerned, the meaning and arrangement of the text of the Barzanji riwaayats and Ashraqal presented its challenges, resulting in many robust discussions on the role Boorhaanol can play in consolidating cultural traditions.



One of the key objectives of the Movement is to capture these cultural traditions for posterity, but it was agreed that they are not sacrosanct and should be rectified or adapted should current circumstances so demand.

Another major challenge was the survey conducted among the male and female Moulood jamaahs, with the former dwindling alarmingly, while the latter is mushrooming. Currently there are only 7 active male Moulood jamaahs, while the females number 38.

Alghamdulillah the end product reflected a good balance of history, seerah, culture, survey and innovation, and will add value to the growth and culture of the Muslim community, Insha Allah.

The audio component presented its own set of challenges, and but for the huge sacrifices made by the Boorhaanol Bilal Team, may not have seen the light of day. Logistics, changes to the text and technical issues all threatened to frustrate the team, but their patience, willpower and motivation pulled them through, Alghamdulillah.

Today the book and audio combo stand testimony to a magnificent team effort by all at the Boorhaanol team that produced a worthy asset to the Cape Muslim community, Alghamdulillah.

### SUCCESSFUL LAUNCH OF MOULOOD COMBO AT THE HUB

On Sunday 17th October 2021, the day before the Koemies Moulood, Boorhaanol launched its Moulood Book and audio combo in the Expo Room of The Hub in Bo-Kaap. Alghamdulillah, both the book as well as the CD and USB components had been successfully completed just in time for invited guests to be handed complimentary copies as they arrived.

Customary koesisters and hot coffee awaited them in Oemmies Kitchen before being ushered into the Expo Room.

The opening Qiraa'a was rendered by Hafith Wafique Simon, who was followed by Sh Muhammad West in explaining to the audience the theological, poetic and chronological challenges faced by Boorhaanol in compiling the translation of the Barzanji riwaayats and the Ashraqal.

Thereafter the MC, Mohammad Groenewald introduced the guest speaker, academic and historian Abdud Daiyaan Petersen, who took his audience onto a Cape Muslim cultural journey into the past.

Arguably the highlight of the event was then presented by the Boorhaanol Bilal Team who rendered salawaat onto our Rasool (pbuh) in their beloved melodious manner.

Gamiem Khan as the Ameer of the group, then thanked his team for their commitment and sacrifices, whereafter Achmat Kiyaam Bassier delivered the Vote of Thanks. He emphasised that inasmuch as the book and audio bears the Boorhaanol label, it remains a team effort of the assembled (and other) guests, and

that they are very much part of the Boorhaanol family.



### **Resilient Cultural Hub Makes Us Proud**





As part of the Soup Kitchen initiative, bulk cooking of hot meals takes place at least once a week of about 750 servings for the poor and needy of Bo-Kaap which includes homeless people. A further 30 pots of food were cooked over the weekend of voter registration to serve 4800 people at the various ANC registration kiosks in the Cape Metro area. The local soccer team FCBK was also served with hot meals for their soccer tournament.

### **MARKET DAYS**

To generate income for the Hub, two market days were held on the Forecourt of Boorhaanol Centre, namely a Heritage Day Food Fair and a Moulood Market Day. At the Heritage Day Food Fair the focus was on traditional foods like pens and pootjies, sugar bean bredie and worreltjies and ertjies. It



created a lot of excitement and was well received. A 'singkring' with traditional folk music and hollandse liedjies kept the crowd entertained under strict COVID protocols.

At the Moulood Market Day visitors were given an opportunity to view the exhibition of 'rampies cutting'. The ladies and children were all dressed up in moedering and flower girl dresses respectively to ensure that the culture and traditions is kept alive. The Moulood book and audio were also launched on the day followed by a lunch for all those that assisted or con-



tributed towards this initiative which was well supported.

### PALESTINIAN VISITOR

A Food Fair with a difference was presented on **Saturday 25th August 2021** by the Boorhaanol Movement on the Boorhaanol Centre Forecourt area. As a celebration of heritage within the Cape Muslim community, the Movement decided to publicise, romanticise and culinarize exotic dishes like pootjies (trotters)

and pens (stomach), old time dessert favourites like aartappel porring (potato pudding) and plaat pastei (tray pie) and typical kifaitkosse (janaazah foods) like worreltjies and ertjies (carrots and peas stew), which were popular back in the days when walking to the cemetery with the bier was still in vogue.

Uncertain about how this generation will react to these offerings, the Movement decided to strongly advise pre-ordering in order to gauge the demand.



The response from the public was highly enthusiastic, both before and on the day of the Food Fair, such that many of the dishes were sold out within two hours of opening on the day.

The Food Fair also offered many other stall holders the opportunity to

After the Moulood programme we were invited to appear on the local radio station, where we were interviewed and then rendered a short thikr and salawaat.

Over the entire weekend that trademark hospitality of the PE community came strongly to the fore. Our sincere gratitude to Sheikh Mukhtar and his team for being such perfect hosts. In his farewell speech to the group, Sheikh Mukhtar commented that it was not a 'good-bye' but rather the start of a long and fruitful relationship between the two Masaajid communities. 
